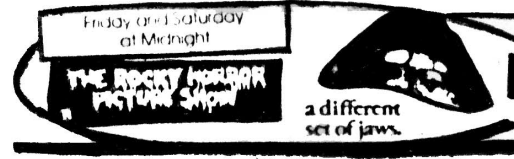

STAR SPOTLIGHT : Tim Curry

Frank N. Furter (Tim Curry) is by far the most outrageous character in the "Rocky Horror Picture Show."

As a performer, Tim Curry has worked in just about every medium from Shakespeare to opera to his own nightclub act. He has portrayed Shakespeare in the ABC mini-series "The Life of Shakespeare" and Mozart in the award winning play "Amdaus," for which he received a Tony nomination. More recently, he has appeared as Bill Cync in the CBS special "Oliver Twist." In the "Rocky Horror Picture Show," Curry skyrocketed to international fame. In his role, Curry adds a spark (or is it SPOCK?) of life.

Born in Chesire, England, the son of a methodist minister, Curry studied Drama and English at Cambridge and at Birmingham University with combined honors.

Coming up for the star is a role in the movie version of the stage success "Annie," in which he co-stars with Carol Burnett and Bernadette Peters. Also, back home, he will star in the London production of "The Pirates of Panzance."

His newest album, "Simplicity," on A&M Records, is anything but simple. The record brings together the many sides of Tim and includes remakes of "Dancing in the Street" and "She's Not There."
