Thanks for writing. Answers:

- 1) The RHPS was definitely NOT meant as a cult film when it was first released back in 1975. It was released just like any other movie and shown in theatres around the country. It bombed. Badly. Some theatre owner in New York City started showing the movie at midnights on Fridays & Saturdays and, well, the rest is history. The RHPS movie was derived from the Rocky Horror Show, a London play that also played in the USA, back in 1973. The play was meant as a spoof of 50's & 60's sci-fi and horror movies.
- 2) Many of the kooks in the audience get their script by simply coming to the movie week after week. They pick up on lines by hearing others say them. After a while, I suppose the more imaginative of them begin making up a few of their own and, if the audience thinks they are good, they'll catch on with the majority. There are certain lines that seem to have stuck with Rocky over time, and thus you have the "script" effect, but new lines are being brought out every week. It's very informal. This is not church by any means.
- 3) Of course we would be interested in new material. Just go ahead and hollor out some new stuff. It's not like you have to take out a permit to do it. If you want to practice more quickly than simply coming to the movie, there is an audience participation album available in some record stores. Unfortunately for your purposes, the album contains an audience saying lines in unison (it HAD to be rehearsed), but it DOES contain all the words and music to the movie. Ask for the PARTICIPATION album, not to be confused with the SOUNDTRACK albums to the movie or play.
