

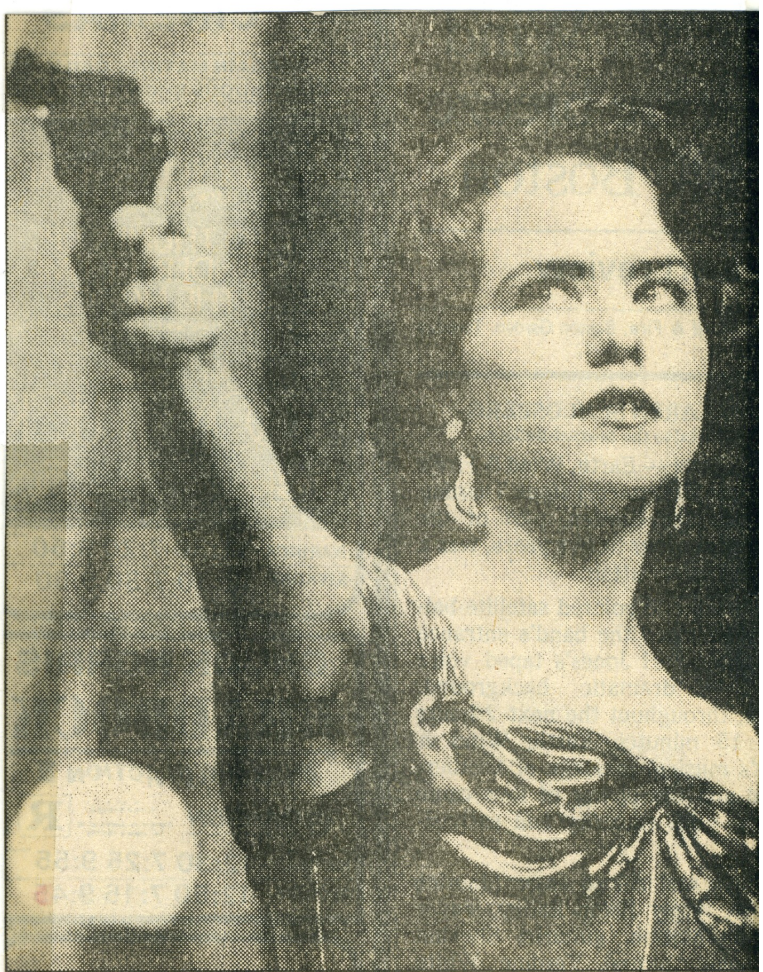


The Most Famous of Them All (almost)

Despite the recording success of Meatloaf in the late 70's and the movie success of Tim Curry, Barry Bostwick, and Susan in the 80's, there was one actress in the RHPS who almost became the most famous actress to emerge from the movie: Koo Stark. Koo was not even a Transylvanian in the movie, but was a bit actress in the Wedding scene (see her face circled in the picture below amidst Ralph & Betty and in front of 3 rather suspicious-looking characters in the background). If you remember, it was only a few years ago that Koo was the girlfriend of Prince Andrew before he married Sarah Ferguson, making her the Duchess of York instead of Koo.

Koo's cool cash

She may have lost Prince Andrew, but actress Koo Stark got the money. She's picked up "substantial" cash by way of libel damages and a public apology yesterday from a newspaper that claimed she was bitter over losing out in love to Sarah Ferguson. Express Newspapers, owners of the mass-circulation Star which printed the article headed "She's welcome to him . . ." in February 1986, apologized to Miss Stark and said it regretted any embarrassment to her.

KOO STARK'S name is in the headlines again — this time in uncomplimentary reviews for her stage debut. Stark, the one-time soft-porn actress who had a celebrated 18-month romance with **PRINCE ANDREW**, now the Duke of York, is appearing in **AGATHA CHRISTIE'S And Then There Were None** — at, ironically enough, the Duke of York Theater in London. Her producer, **BILL KENWRIGHT**, described her as having "real star quality." But the critics were less enthusiastic. Said one: "The stark truth is that it's doubtful **MERYL STREEP** will be worried."
